now in an affordable edition a splendid pageant of the animal kingdom as the middle ages saw it as the 587 colorful images in this magnificent volume reveal animals were a constant and delightful presence in illuminated manuscripts throughout the middle ages they were illustrated not only in bestiaries the compendiums of animal fact and fable that were exceedingly popular in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries but in every sort of manuscript sacred and profane from the gospels to

the romance of the rose this book is arranged in manner of a proper bestiary with essays on the medieval lore and iconography of one hundred creatures alphabetized by their latin names from the alauda or lark whose morning song was thought to be a hymn to creation to the vultur whose taste for carrion made it a symbol of the sinner who indulges in worldly pleasures the selection includes a number of creatures that would now be considered fantastic including the griffin the manticore and of course the fabled unicorn

taking darwin s publication of origin of species as a significant point of departure it discusses such key authors as hardy lawrence kipling wells orwell and others arguing that the variety and richness of this literature represents a revival in the fortunes of bestiary literature

the photographs in this volume show the incomparable richness of the pharaonic fauna in all forms of artistic expression painting sculpture relief carving architectural ornamentation and even in hieroglyphs ranging from astonishing realism in the depiction of birds and beasts both wild and domesticated with which the people of the Nile valley came into daily contact to hieratic stylization in portraying the pantheon of animal headed gods and the sacred and fabulous creatures that inhabited the ancient Egyptians devotional funerary and magic world

the bestiary is a book of animals the second family bestiary is the most important version this study addresses the work s purpose and audience it includes a critical edition and new english translation and a catalogue raisonne of the manuscripts

a celebration of the visual contributions of the bestiary one of the most popular types of illuminated books during the middle ages and an exploration of its lasting legacy brimming with lively animals both real and fantastic the bestiary was one of the great illuminated manuscript traditions of the middle ages encompassing imaginary creatures such as the unicorn siren and griffin exotic beasts including the tiger elephant and ape as well as animals native to Europe like the beaver dog and hedgehog the bestiary is a vibrant testimony to the medieval understanding of animals and their role in the world so iconic were the stories and images of the bestiary that its beasts essentially escaped from the pages appearing in a wide variety of manuscripts and other objects including tapestries ivories metalwork and sculpture with over 270 color illustrations and contributions by twenty five leading scholars this gorgeous volume explores the bestiary and its widespread influence on

medieval art and culture as well as on modern and contemporary artists like pablo picasso and damien hirst published to accompany an exhibition on view at the j paul getty museum at the getty center may 14 to august 18 2019

from the bestiaries in the collections of the british library ann payne has culled wonderful illustrations she has linked them with a sampling of the poetry the folk wisdom and the romantic imagination of the formative years of western civilization the antioch review

this sourcebook serves both as an introduction and a wide ranging reference work for human attitudes to nonhuman animals in latin europe during the middle ages under twelve headings it includes numerous translated passages from latin and vernacular texts that reflect human conceptions and uses of other animals during the period 300 1520 theologians philosophers encyclopaedists bestiarists hagiographers chroniclers huntsmen and writers of agricultural manuals cookbooks and plague treatises all had something to say about the place of nonhuman animals in their world and their interaction with humans or simply recorded incidentally what they did in their writings all are represented here

from the familiar to the improbable the gross to the endearing the modern bestiary is a compendium of curious creatures it includes both animals that have made headlines and those you ve probably never heard of such as skin eating caecilians harp sponges or zombie worms also known as bone eating snout flowers arranged by elements earth water air the modern bestiary contains well known species told from new unexpected angles rats that drive cars fish that communicate by passing wind as well as stranger and lesser known creatures including carnivorous mice that howl at the moon cross dressing cuttlefish and antechinuses small marsupials that literally mate themselves to death finally there are the aliens on earth the incredible the surreal the magical such as tardigrades tongue eating lice and immortal jellyfish creatures so astonishing that they make unicorns look rather commonplace written by a zoologist with a flair for storytelling this is a fascinating celebration of the animal kingdom

aristotle s zoological writings with their wealth of detailed investigations on diverse species of animals have fascinated medieval and renaissance culture this volume explores how these texts have been read in various traditions arabic hebrew latin and how they have been incorporated in different genres in philosophical and scientific treatises in florilegia and encyclopedias in theological symbolism in moral allegories and in manuscript illustrations this multidisciplinary and multilinguistic approach highlights substantial aspects of aristotle s animals

minding animals in the old and new worlds employs current research in cognitive science and the philosophy of animal cognition to explore how humans have understood non human animals in the iberian world from the middle ages through the early modern period using texts from european and indigenously informed sources steven wagschal argues that people tend to conceptualize the minds of animals in ways that reflect their own uses for the animal the manner in which they interact with the animal and the place in which the animal lives often this has little if anything to do with the actual cognitive abilities of the animal however occasionally early authors made surprisingly accurate assumptions about the thoughts and feelings of animals wagschal explores a number of ways in which culture and human cognition interact including the utility of anthropomorphism the symbolic use of animals in medieval christian texts attempts at understanding the minds of animals in spain s early modern farming and hunting books the effect of novelty on animal conceptualizations in new world histories and how cervantes navigated the forms of anthropomorphism that preceded him to create the first embodied animal minds in fiction

what strange transactions take place in the mobile spaces between loci how does the flow of forces between fixed points enliven texts suggest new connections and map out the dizzying motion of myriad interactions the essays in this volume were first presented at the 2014 new chaucer society congress in reykjavik iceland where a meeting of minds in a shared intermediate space initiated dialogue from diverse perspectives and wended its way through the invisible spaces between concrete categories objects and entities the resulting volume asks a core question what can we learn by tarrying at the nexus points and hubs through which things move in and out of texts attempting to trace not the things themselves or their supposedly stable significations but rather their forms of emergence and retreat of disorder and disequilibrium the answer is complex and intermediate for we ourselves are emerging and retreating within our own systems of transit and experiencing our own disequilibrium scholarship like transit is never complete and yet never congeals into inertia through the manifold explorations of the dynamic transit transports scapes and flows found within literary and chaucerian thought worlds new vistas of motion and motivation emerge following john urry s mobile sociology the volume advances the notion that we can no longer view either social worlds or textual worlds as uniform surfaces upon which one can trace or write a history of the horizontal movements of humans and human mentalities rather everything is in constant motion objects images information ideas and mobility is thus also vertical involving human and non human actants the essays in this volume consider then how medieval literary texts in chaucer s period rewrap time and space by the means of sophisticated transit and transport structures which might be traced within specific works but also across works such as in text networks motive entities within literature twist and turn interact and collide and destabilise predictable trajectories with unpredictable vigor table of contents james l smith introduction transport scape flow medieval transit systems christopher roman bios in the prik of conscience the apophatic body and the sensuous soul jennie friedrich concordia

first penned in egypt between the 2nd and 4th centuries the physiologus brought together poetic descriptions of animals and their christian allegories translated into a wide range of languages from across north africa and much of europe each version of the physiologus adapted the text in culturally specific ways that yield fascinating insights for those who delve into this truly global tradition of representing and interpreting animals this edition provides the texts and translations of the only two surviving english versions the old english physiologus from the late 10th century exeter book and the middle english physiologus from the mid 13th century ms arundel 292 as well as translations of a range of latin french and old english sources and analogues underpinned by a commitment to both the fields of medieval studies and animal studies this book provides an accessible introduction to the literary history of the physiologus and the politics of animal representation asking the vital question how can we understand humanity s relationships with non human animals and the environment today without understanding their past

these interdisciplinary essays focus on animals as symbols ideas or images in medieval art and literature

the depiction and symbolism of animals have always fascinated us this book illustrates their crucial importance in medieval art from the sixth to the eleventh centuries and describes their use in sculpture manuscripts embroidery and metalwork it shows how the underlying celtic and germanic traditions combined with mediterranean influences to produce a far stronger animal art in britain than anywhere else in europe here pagan imagery and symbolism were transmuted into christian art and teaching and by studying animal subjects in the whole of the british isles rather than one region in particular the artistic links between the pictis anglo saxons and irish gradually emerge placing the emphasis on the naturalist tradition as well as the characteristic interlacing forms animals in early medieval art uncovers the origins of the fantastic beasts of the bestiary and draws conclusions about the transmission of motifs and ideas in general book jacket title summary field provided by blackwell north america inc all rights reserved
